Chairperson's Report:

2011 saw my third year as Chairperson. I felt honoured to remain one of a team of 11 voluntary Trustees, all committed to embracing the challenges and opportunities faced in providing a range of support services tailored to the needs of the communities we serve.

A decade on from the horrific Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak UTASS is delighted to have a continued and growing presence within our Durham Dales communities. Despite the austere times 2011 was a steady year financially for UTASS, however, we are not complacent and have undertaken significant work this year in an attempt to try and ensure we can continue providing much needed services into 2013. I would again ask that members consider additional ways to raise funds to help sustain us during the lean times ahead. We extend thanks to all donors for their valuable contributions.

In May 2011 we were delighted to take delivery of a **new 4x4 mini bus funded** by The ASDA Foundation. Please see the photograph below. The mini bus was well utilised by a variety of community groups and it is used on Thursday evenings to bring children and young people from the most isolated farms into our youth club sessions. I must extend a huge thank you to all those Volunteers who give up their precious time to either drive the min bus or chaperone on journeys.



2011 saw the very successful completion of our **Farmers of the Future** project with all trainees progressing into employment, self employment or further education. More information about Farmers of the Future can be found at page 22 of this report.

We had yet another brilliant response from members to our Annual Service User Survey with incredibly high numbers stating how UTASS helps them cope and reduces some of their stress. It is most heart warming to hear how much UTASS is appreciated and valued by its members.

We launched the "Friends of UTASS" scheme in mid December 2011 and we were pleased with the initial uptake by 10 households raising £325. As well as supporting the work of UTASS the benefits of becoming a Friend include entry into an annual prize draw with a minimum value of £100 and 20% discount on UTASS Christmas cards and room hire. In 2012 we plan to further promote the Friends of UTASS to a wider audience.

We encourage you to read our report in more depth to discover more about what UTASS is doing. We look forward to continuing our work with you for the benefit of our community.

On behalf of the UTASS Trustees can I say how enormously grateful we are to everyone who has provided support this year especially our Patrons and Funders. I also thank my fellow Trustees, our wonderful Staff and invaluable Volunteers for their unstinting dedication and commitment. We will move into 2012 with a positive approach and, as always, willingness to provide help wherever and whenever it is required.

Project Manager's Report:

On behalf of our dedicated, caring and hard working Staff, Trustees, Volunteers and Patrons I am again delighted to report on work we have been involved in for public benefit throughout 2011, which included:

- Practical support with the completion and submission of complex forms and paperwork, including awareness raising.
- Production and dissemination of regular briefings consisting of essential information distilled and de-jargonised from Defra, EU etc. and predominantly pertinent to the running of livestock based farm businesses.
- In cases of severe hardship, acting as third party referrers to organisations which include ARC Addington Trust and RABI.
- Support and training in setting up of sustainable methods of dealing with on-farm paperwork, including the computerisation of records.
- Quarterly Community Newsletters.
- Various training courses based on locally identified needs.
- Short term loan of ICT equipment (try before you buy)
- Advocacy and liaison work with local Landlords, Defra, Trading Standards & other agencies.
- Lamb Bank, Sales & Wants and Labour/Skills List development work.
- Organisation and delivery of social & community events.
- Topical presentations & awareness raising events.
- Requesting & receiving feedback on consultations at local, regional & national levels.
- General drop in and telephone advice on a range of issues and signposting to other helper organisations & agencies.
- Provision of venue & outreach facilities for a range of agencies & organisations including Citizens Advice Bureau, Durham Dales Action for Carers, Age Concern and Darlington MIND.
- Provision of facilities for pilates sessions, chiropody and community meetings/gatherings.

- Facilities for advertising local businesses/services.
- Internet access, photocopying & faxing facilities.
- Support with the organisation and provision of annual local agricultural shows and monthly Producers Markets.
- Teesdale Heritage Group and Wear & Tees Farmwatch operated under the umbrella of UTASS.

Out of Office Help: Thanks to our precious Volunteers we were able to continue offering year round, 24/7 out of office support for those with urgent needs. This amounted to 7264 hours in 2011 and when costed at the minimum wage of £6.08 per hour equates to a gift in kind contribution of £44,165.12. Other voluntary time given by UTASS Trustees and helpers amounted to £60,669.16 making a fantastic grand total of £104,834.28

Single Farm Payment Work: March, April and early May were extremely busy due to the advice and support offered to members with the preparation and submission of the Single Payment Scheme (SPS) paperwork in time for the Rural Payments Agency (RPA) mid May deadline.

Graziers Groups: We have continued to support and develop 6 Graziers Groups with Cotherstone Moor Field Reeves generously donating their HLS administration fee of £9,935.00 to UTASS. The 6 Graziers Groups will receive £3,780,750.00 amongst them between 2011 - 2021.

UTASS Membership: Continued to be free of charge and increased to 1679 family members coming from 571 households in the Durham Dales (491 Farms & 80 other households/agencies/organisations). UTASS remained the largest membership registered charity in the Durham Dales

Contact Monitoring Data:

20,432 contacts (3,793 or 22.8% more than last year).

- 1 Footpath diversion application
- 376 Animal Movement License notifications sent for members

As well as sending important paperwork, forms etc. via our recorded delivery co-operative mailing system, 5 special journeys were made to the RPA by our Agricultural Secretary (Tessa Wigham) to hand deliver SPS applications and gain proof of submission.

Economic Benefits Gained:

Outcomes arising from most of the work undertaken by UTASS are unquantifiable as, for example, we cannot accurately measure how many people would miss deadlines had they not received information/support from UTASS.

Quantifiable Economic Benefits Gained Included:

- Based on an average Single Farm Payment of £13,680.00 , assisting 210 members equates to approximately £2,872,800.00
- Direct assistance with SPS forms given to 210 farm businesses. Assume an average Single Farm Payment of £13,680. Assume 20% 'minor' mistakes with 10% penalties equates to £57,456.00
- Support with UELS and HLS combined 88 members equates to a minimum of £6,700,00.00 for the 10 year duration of the scheme.
- 17% automatic penalties for failure to maintain a Soil Protection Review (Cross Compliance) would equate to a minimum of £57,000 if applied to 5% of our membership.

- Assistance to members with electronic applications for cattle passports, when assuming 5% of our membership would miss a deadline without our intervention, which would require them to pay for the dam and the calf to be DNA tested - this would amount to a minimum of £4,000.00
- Based on 50% of UTASS farming members being Farm Assured, each farm selling 200 new lambs, 50 old season lambs and 20 beef animals equates to a minimum of £395,000.00
- Value of training assistance to members amounted to over £47,634.00
- Value to local B&B's of 30 people staying overnight locally after attending events at UTASS (average 2 night each) = 60 overnight stays at £65 per night £3,900. These people also ate at local restaurants.
- Average attendance of 500 visitors at indoor (winter) local producers markets at UTASS. Some of which go on to spend in other open local shops and restaurants.

Member Feedback: As ever we received a fantastic response to our **Annual Service Users Survey**. Members again told us that UTASS support in dealing with 'authority' has continued to reduce stress and help them cope. They also stated the support received minimises the distraction from running a business and that this has significant health, economic and social benefits.

Briefings: A key part of our service is our briefings to members, which aim to give as simply and concisely as possible the essential information distilled from the reams of publications and books emanating from DEFRA. Failure to comply can be costly as support payments can then be subject to penalties. Our goal is to help our members to get all the support payments that they are entitled to. 6 briefings were produced amounting to almost 3,426 mailings. Briefings covered a wide range of topics including Single Payment Scheme (SPS) issues, Sheep Movements, Bovine TB, Cattle Passports and the Shepherds Guide.

Training: 1847 hours of training for 139 people was organised through UTASS. 15 people were referred onto other training providers, leading to 90 hours of training and our involvement with the Monitor Farm Project resulted in 861 training hours with 292 eligible attendances. Total value of all training £46,624.00. Please see APPENDIX 1 at page 28

Ann Bell, UTASS Office Systems, Monitoring and Admin Support Worker was the Secretary of Langdon Beck Show and Richard Betton was the License Holder and Bio-Security Officer for both the High Force and Langdon Beck Shows.



ICT Support: The use of the community computers in UTASS increased again this year - mainly due to job search activities and tourists. Our bank of short term loan ICT equipment was constantly utilised by eligible

members. Our PowerPoint projector and screen were also loaned out on numerous occasions for wider community benefit.

Computerised Farm Records and Agricultural Secretarial Work:

Assistance with computerised farm records, to comply with current legislation, continued to be provided through our Agricultural Secretarial Support Services. This support for UTASS members minimises the chances of penalties being incurred during on-farm inspections.

Lamb Bank, Skills & Services and Sales & Wants schemes continued to be very well used.

WORK WITH CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE:

Young Peoples' Drop In Facilities:

The Drop In continued to offer much needed facilities on weekday evenings, some weekends and during school holidays for local Young People. Many of those living on remote farms were transported to and from activities in the **new UTASS mini bus**.

The Young People continued to play their part in the management, development and financing of their project and the Drop In achieved **Investing in Children** status for the 6th year running.

A total of 148 Young People (74 female and 74 male) accessed Drop In and Youth Club at UTASS. This is a 26% increase on last year.

Usually, sessions were delivered 3 nights per week. Thursday nights were the most popular with an average attendance of 65 Young People followed by Monday nights with an average attendance of 25 Young Girls.

Throughout the year some of our work with Children and Young People was funded through the BBC Children in Need. This complemented the work funded by The Raby Charitable Trust, Durham County Council and our fantastic team of Volunteers.

Activities and facilities provided at Young Peoples' sessions included:

- Film & TV nights (including Sky TV)
- Arcade dance mats and car racing machines
- Arts & Crafts
- Takeaway nights included pizzas, Chinese and Indian
- Healthy eating nights
- Games nights including darts, table tennis, carpet bowls & pool competitions
- CV preparation sessions and job application support

- Computer driving tests (both theory and practical)
- Discussion nights (racism, sexism, disability, sexuality, homophobia, domestic violence, contraception, pregnancy, attitudes, values and decision making, illness, death & bereavement, bullying, relationships, health & safety, citizenship, drugs, alcohol, eating disorders, smoking, self harm, depression & mental health, lifestyle issues, exercise & healthy eating, politics, housing issues, careers, school issues, money, law & rights, parenting, crime, politics, school issues, transport, religion, compromise & negotiation skills and volunteering)
- C-Card condom distribution scheme and Chlamydia screening
- X Box, wii, play station and internet café



Farmers of the Future (FoF):

Throughout the year long project each trainee was placed on two or three farms. The farm placements were designed to provide practical "hands on" experience of livestock farming. In addition to the units outlined in **Appendix 2 at page 30** FOF was bespoke and tailored to the needs of the individual trainee (i.e., providing them with additional training in some areas, experiences of different farms etc.).



The independent evaluation found that FOF involved **34 farmer-trainers** and **21 placement farms**. In addition, **23 local farmers** loaned equipment and premises to the project. Over the 12 months that the project ran the trainees learned a diverse range of skills needed for upland farming and Farmers of the Future came to a highly successful end in June with all trainees having either gained employment, set themselves up as self employed contractors or going on to further education.

The support and involvement of local Farmer Trainers was invaluable and the project could not have happened without their passion to share skills, willingness to help others and a sprinkling of patience along the way!

A selection of some of the comments made about the Drop In and Youth Club in 2011:

"I enjoy UTASS because you do good activities and loads of fun things"

"At UTASS you get the chance to meet your friends and lots of other people - I like everything about coming to UTASS"

"The people who run the sessions are easy to talk with and I know I can share my worries with them"

"You can get help with your problems and no one else gets to know your business"

"Coming to UTASS gives me the chance to meet my friends and gets me out of the house - I hate it when I can't go to UTASS"

"At UTASS there are lots of things to do and there's a tuck shop for when you get hungry"

"At UTASS we just get to be ourselves and see our friends"

"You never get bored at UTASS because there's always loads of activities and things to do"

"UTASS is fun and exciting and you get to meet new friends"

"If it wasn't for UTASS we wouldn't be able to go to places like the Metro Centre and Flamingo Land"

"I wouldn't be able to come to UTASS if the mini bus didn't bring me"

"We don't have broadband or a mobile signal up with us so I use the computers at UTASS whenever I can"

OUTREACH FACILITIES AND SERVICES:

Teesdale Citizens Advice Bureau: In 2011 Teesdale Citizens Advice, funded through UTASS, delivered 40, 3 hr drop in advice sessions in the UTASS building in Middleton-in-Teesdale. There were 67 client contacts, 47 of which were new enquiries and 20 were repeat visits to deal with ongoing enquiries. The main enquiry area was Welfare Benefits but we also had a range of other enquiries including debt, housing and employment. We had several enquiries due to clients being affected by the long delays caused by the re-organisation of the Housing Benefit section within Durham County Council. We helped clients by providing relevant information on their rights and responsibilities, making phone calls and writing letters on their behalf. This service continues to be well used by people who live in Middleton-in-Teesdale but also attracts people from further up the dale and outlying villages who find it more convenient to go to Middleton than the main CAB office in Barnard Castle.

<u>Durham Dales Action for Carers:</u> Complementary Therapist, Helen Bellas, provided monthly therapy sessions, including reflexology, Indian head massage and aromatherapy - providing a treat and some "time out" for Carers.

<u>2D</u>: Used UTASS as a Volunteer Centre and for meetings with clients as part of the "Your Choice" employment & volunteering support scheme.

<u>Durham County Council:</u> Community Support Staff held monthly dropin advice surgeries.

<u>Age Concern:</u> Used the premises on a monthly basis for their drop-in advice sessions.

George F White: Farmer advice clinics.

<u>Teesdale Physiotherapy:</u> Pilates sessions on Tuesdays (pm) and Wednesdays (am).

<u>Darlington MIND:</u> Weekly complementary therapy sessions and computer Training until May 2011.

<u>Middleton Plus Development Trust:</u> Monthly indoor Farmers Markets (January, February, March, October and November).

<u>Chiropodist Services</u>: A visiting Chiropodist provided services for private patients on a 6 weekly basis.
